This versatile, state-of-the-art learning space is used primarily for scheduled sessions in which librarians collaborate with faculty members and work with students to develop information literacy skills. When it's not being used for this purpose, the learning space is appropriate for a multitude of other uses including quiet study, peer

collaboration, and special events. The learning space houses wireless laptop computers, a teacher's station and projector, and a flexible furniture arrangement.

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AT YOUR FINGERTIPS Consumer Health Information

Consumer Health Complete and its Spanish language version, Salud En Espanol, are now available at BCCC. These databases have information on all areas of health and wellness from mainstream medicine to alternative, holistic, and integrated medicine. They also include full-text access to major medical reference books such as the *American Medical Association Complete Medical Encyclopedia* and *Complete Guide to Prescription and Nonprescription Drugs*.

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A SUCCESS STORY

The Technology Learning Centers

During 2005-2006 academic year, the staff in the Technology Learning Centers responded to 875 documented requests for help with WebCT, WebAdvisor, WebMail, features in Office 2003, printing and logins to name just a few. During the summer of 2006, there were 57 requests for help and during the 2006-2007 academic year up to the end of April, 820 requests have been documented. These numbers do not reflect the hundreds and hundreds of simple questions asked by students or the help provided by the TLC staff throughout the semesters.

The Technology Learning Centers provide a wide range of services, including answering

questions regarding logins and passwords, Internet browsers and the Intranet, and WebMail. During the spring semester, new services were made available to students, that being wireless connectivity for personal notebooks and student logins to the workstations throughout the campus. Because of the reliability of the TLCs, students know where they can get help if they have problems.

In addition, TLC staff members regularly develop and post to the web Low Threshold Activities (LTAs), or quick tips located at <http://www.bucks.edu/tlc/ltas.html>, that guide students, faculty, and staff members in accom-

plishing simple technological tasks, such as logging into the new campus network, creating a trusted site in a browser, or managing junk mail in Microsoft Outlook. The TLCs provide one-on-one face-to-face assistance, and 24/7 online self-paced tutorial guidance in using Microsoft Operating Systems and the Office Suite, Online Learning Management Systems (e.g. Blackboard), and WebAdvisor. The tutorials can be found at http://www.bucks.edu/tlc/training_tutorials.html.

The staff in the TLCs look forward to working with you.

NEW ELECTRONIC DATABASE CQ Researcher

BCCC has recently added the well-respected CQ Researcher (CQR) to its ever-growing list of online databases.

This unique database provides original, comprehensive reporting on issues in the news, covering the twentieth and twenty first centuries. In-depth and unbiased,

CQR examines health, social trends, criminal justice, international affairs, education, the environment, science and technology, and the economy.

Each topic is profiled in-depth with a 12,000 word research report that includes: an issue overview, a background analysis, a timeline, an assessment of the current situa-

tion, tables, maps, pro/con viewpoints, and a bibliography. This user-friendly and comprehensive database includes CQR reports from 1990 through the present, as well as Editorial Researcher Reports from 1923 through 1990.

tium is a collaborative effort by over 100 institutions of higher education and organizations worldwide that are committed to providing access to educational coursework free of charge via the Internet. Nations represented include China, France, Japan, and the United Kingdom to name a few. It is truly an international effort. Because of the multi lingual approach to this information there are translation sites that will assist the student in translating course materials

MIT's course offerings are available via the Internet free of charge through the OpenCourseWare Consortium. Each active participant has a listing for each class offered complete with class notes, reading lists, assignments as well as the course syllabus. The year that the class was taught is noted. Some of the institutions participating now have RSS feeds in place. Many allow for signing up via an email newsletter to receive current information on the programs offered.

ONLINE @YOUR LIBRARY Science Direct

Of the electronic resources most recently acquired by the Library, the most significant by far is ScienceDirect. It's a collection of nearly 1500 full-text, peer-reviewed journals covering all aspects of the sciences, along with citations and abstracts for articles in an additional 1000 journals. You can link to ScienceDirect from the Library's Online Resources page (<http://www.bucks.edu/library/eresources/>). There are several ways to use it:

Use It as a Virtual Library

If you're looking for a specific article, or you just want to browse the most recent issue of a journal in your subject area, click the "Browse" tab at the top of the page. You can browse titles alphabetically or by subject. You can also search for a particular journal by using the "Quick Search" near the top of the page.

The page icon accompanying the journal title tells you whether we have full-text access to that journal: a green icon means Yes and a white icon means No. If you want, you can limit your browse list to full-text titles.

Use It as a Database for Finding Articles

You can use ScienceDirect to find articles on a research topic by choosing among three interface options, each geared to a different level of user. "Quick Search," conveniently placed near the top of every page in ScienceDirect, does simple key-word, author, and journal title searches.

For greater flexibility, click the "Search" tab at the top of the page. "Advanced Search" allows you to limit your search to specific fields (such as title, author, abstract, or references), or to specific subjects, document types, and publication dates.

For the truly adventurous, "Expert Search" provides a box for creating your own Boolean search command using connectors (AND, OR, AND NOT, etc.) and field limiters. And no fear, the Help pages are easy to navigate.

Use It as a Personal Library

Become a registered user—it's easy to do and it's free—and you can customize ScienceDirect for your own research needs:

- Store information about journals you've looked at, recent searches, and entire full-text articles.
- Set up email alerts: ScienceDirect will automatically run your search at regular intervals and email you the results, so you never miss the most recently-published articles in your subject area.
- Create a personal library of favorite journals for quick and easy browsing.
- Personalize ScienceDirect's main page with links to your favorite journals, articles, frequently used ScienceDirect features, and even your favorite Internet sites.

ScienceDirect is useful for every level of researcher in the sciences. And Information Literacy orientations to ScienceDirect are available for classes, for groups of faculty, and for individuals. Just contact the Library!

For Faculty Using CE6

Would you like to provide links to the library's online resources (such as EBSCOhost) on your CE6 sites? You can, but there's a trick to it.

Here are some tips that will help you avoid problems with student access to the databases.

Do not copy the database's URL from the address bar of your browser. This URL will not allow students to log in to the database from off-campus computers. Instead, please follow one of these procedures:

1. Provide a link to the library's Online Resources page at <http://www.bucks.edu/library/eresources/index.html> along with instructions to link from this page to the databases you recommend:

OR

2. You can provide direct links to the databases, following these steps:

- Go to the library's Online Resources page at <http://www.bucks.edu/library/eresources/index.html>.
- Place your mouse pointer over the link to the database you wish to provide access to. Write down the URL that appears in your browser's status bar (located at the bottom of the screen; go to View/Status Bar at the top menu of your browser if it does not appear). This is the only URL that will allow students to connect to the database from off-campus.
- Create a link on your CE6 page, using the URL that you wrote down.
